

Transfer Station

Winter (November – February) hours are now in effect.

The Aberdeen Transfer Station is open Wednesdays and Saturdays from 10:00am until 4:00pm. If you do not have a current Transfer Station card, please contact the office at 306-253-4312 or through email. Please check the RM of Aberdeen website for a list of accepted materials.

Controlled Burn

The RM Council would like to remind everyone to take extreme caution while having a controlled burn. Do not forget to register your burns:

- 1. Register with the Municipality: call **306-253-4312** or **306-230-1603** (Adrien Hamoline Fire Chief) after hours and weekends.
- 2. Register with the Provincial Fire Center at **1-866-404-4911**.

If a passing motorist reports a fire that you have not registered with the Municipality *and* the Provincial Fire Center, you will be fined **\$1000**. If our fire department deems it necessary to call in fire fighters from neighbouring Municipalities, all costs will be forwarded to the person responsible for starting the fire. Please ensure you have proper Fire Fighting Insurance coverage.

Plowing Snow

With winter on the horizon, we would like to remind everyone that plowing snow onto or across Municipal right-of-way is not a permitted practice. Snow must be pushed onto or piled on your own property. Guilty parties will be subject to fines. Please familiarize yourself with our Snow Removal Policy and Snow Clearing Bylaw.

2023 MONTHLY TAX DISCOUNTS / PENALTIES:

For prompt payment of 2023 taxes the following discounts are allowed:

Payments received in January 6.5% discount Payments received in February 5.5% discount Payments received in March 4% discount Payments received in April 3% discount Payments received in May 2% discount Payments received in June 1% discount Payments received in July .5% discount

Penalties for 2023 Tax arrears will be as follows:

August 1 (compounded monthly) 1% September 1 1% October 1 1% November 1 1% December 1 1%

On January 1, 2023 a 12% penalty will be applied to 2022 arrears

Taxes are imposed the first day of January in each year and are due July 31.

Please remember there is NO discount for the School Portion of Taxes

Tax Estimate Notices for 2023 taxes will be sent in December 2022. 2023 Tax Notices will be sent mid May, once the School Division levies have been established and the Municipal Mill Rate has been set.

In order for Voyent Alert to work effectively we need more residents to sign up. Currently we have 190 people participating = 129 households (some are from the same household) which is great, 30 are still unknown to us (signed up anonymously). We need to know who you are. Of the 310 homes & businesses this potentially leaves us with 181 properties where we would have to go door to door in case of emergency (which can take a number of hours). The Voyent Alert sends out a notification of emergency in seconds.

It's never too early for a SNOW REMOVAL PLAN

Snow removal will be done on roadways from Monday thru Friday, and weekends by necessity only. Sand/gravel will be spread on streets and corners where icy, and as needed to help diminish potential risks to our residents and vehicular traffic.

Priority 1 School Route – Central Avenue, Main Street, Second Avenue and Thompson Street

Priority 2 Emergency Services – Industrial Drive, Fifth Avenue South

Priority 3 Residential Streets, Main Street Sidewalk

Priority 4 Alleys where required.

Back alleys are Town property and NOT a storage area! Bylaw Enforcement **Officer** will be visiting any property owners who have left items in the alley. Please clear your back alley before snow falls for proper snow removal.

Speed Bumps Placed Along Central Avenue

We have had several concerns brought up regarding the speed bumps placed along Central Avenue. These were put in place to try and slow down the number of people speeding along a very heavily used roadway inside of town. It is not only heavily used by vehicle traffic but also pedestrian as we have limited sidewalks.

We have numerous reports of people speeding and not paying attention to stop signs along that and other stretches of roads on town.

To give people some ideas as of the numbers here they are:

- 1. There is an average of 13,600 vehicles that use that roadway every month.
- 2. Over 8,700 of them go through that zone at a speed above what would be an enforceable limit in the city, more than 10 km/hr over the posted speed limit. Of those 8,700 that could be receiving a ticket starting at almost 300 dollars there are another 373 that have exceeded the speed limit by double and would warrant a fine of close to 800 dollars and a vehicle seizure. That also doesn't take into account the extremely high rates of speed we have tracked on the roadway exceeding 100km/hr.
- 3. Then there is the most important issue of safety ... when you increase your speed from 30 km/hr (the posted limit) to 60 km/hr your stopping distance goes from 5m (approx. 15ft) to 20m (60ft) and that doesn't take into account any of the human factors i.e.) reaction times, distracted etc. ... So, if a child chases a dropped ball or goes after a friend without looking you can very easily see the consequences.
- 4. There have been multiple requests to get people to slow down but the message just doesn't seem to be getting through. The speed bumps are a work in progress and just one of several ongoing attempts to keep our residents safe.
- 5. The speed collection devices have been vandalized yet again and it has been reported to the RCMP. Every time this happens the town needs to spend money to fix them as they were funded by an SGI grant and the data they collect is required by SGI to allow us access to even more grant money ie) veterans park sidewalks.

Hopefully this gives our residents a clearer picture of what is going on and the attempts by council to address the issue. Remember the people on Council are volunteers and don't have all of the answers just a desire and willingness to help their community and try and make Aberdeen an even better place to live. If anyone has any info about who continues to vandalize town property contact the RCMP as they have a file started thank you

ABERDEEN & DISTRICT FIRE AND RESCUE

Fire Prevention Week – October 8-14, 2023. "Cooking Safety Starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention.™", reinforces simple, yet critical, actions people can take to reduce their risk of cooking fires and burns. Cooking remains the #1 cause of home fires and injuries, with unattended cooking the leading cause of cooking-related fire deaths. Whether cooking on a stove, in the oven, on a grill, or even with an electric cooking appliance, there are a variety of things people can do to prevent burns and fires from happening. In a modern-day world full of distractions, this year's theme underscores some simple actions everyone can take, including:

- Watch what you heat and set a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep kids 3 feet (1 m) from the stove/grill/oven and anywhere hot foods/liquids are being served.
- Turn pot handles towards the back of the stove.
- Always keep a lid nearby; if a small fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.

We took this opportunity to speak with Kindergarten to Grade 3 students at Aberdeen Composite School how to be fire safe. The more people who become fire safe, the less fires we will have in Saskatchewan. We are impressed with the growing display of awareness in children and their homes.

Jonathan Charette was chosen to be Fire Chief for a Day. Jonathan was picked up for school in the fire truck and then taken home at the end of the day with the fire truck. Jonathan also got a few extra prizes.

It is important to develop a home fire escape plan today....it could save your life tonight. Everyone must know what to do and where to when the smoke alarm sounds. Take a few minutes with everyone in your household to make a home fire escape plan.

- Draw a floor plan of your home
- Include all possible emergency exits
- Show two ways out of every room, if possible.
- Does anyone need help to escape?
- Choose a meeting place outside
- Call 9-1-1 from outside your home
- Practice your escape
- Get out and stay out

Our department again handed out a number of smoke alarms during the presentation. Smoke alarms are vital to fire safety at home. They are the best line of defence to alert your family to evacuate. They save lives.

It is important to ensure every area of your home is covered by a smoke alarm. A fire can start in any room. To increase your chances of escaping safely, follow these tips from the Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom and outside each sleeping area.
- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home.
- Test smoke alarms using the test button at least once a month or as recommended by the manufacturer.
- Change the battery at least once a year. If the alarm chirps regularly, this is the signal for a low-battery and/or the unit needs to be changed.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for cleaning. Keeping your smoke alarm clean makes a big difference.
- Check the age of your smoke alarm. If it is 10 years or older, it needs to be replaced.
- Immediately replace any smoke alarm that does not respond properly when tested.

- Make sure everyone in the home recognizes the sound of a smoke alarm a loud beeping sound means smoke (or carbon monoxide) is present.
- Get out, call 911, and stay out.
- Use smoke alarms that can be interconnected by hard-wiring or wireless technology. When one interconnected smoke alarm sounds, every smoke alarm in the building will sound.

The most effective and natural way to teach children about fire safety is to set a good example when you're using things like matches, lighters, candles, fireplaces, campfires, etc. If you always use a fire source in a safe manner, the greater the chances of children understanding that they are not toys.


